

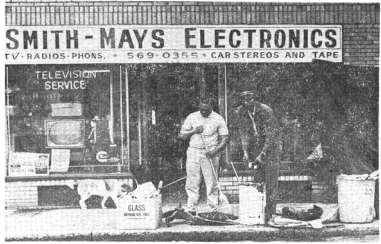

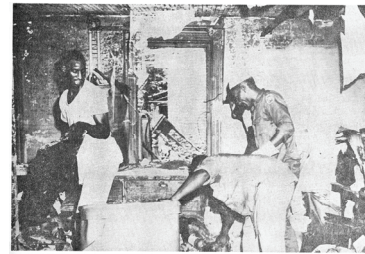

Englewood Hit By Fire No. 15

 Englewood — A liquid fire bomb ignited the 15th fire in the predominantly black 4th Ward last night, leaving 10 people homeless. It also may have provided the first glimpse of the suspected arsonist.

The fire broke out through a second-floor window in the rear of a two-story apartment house at 27 Englewood ave. just before 1:30 p.m. yesterday.

A building tenant told police that seconds later he saw a man running down a fire escape directly before the fire-bombed apartment.

The fire spread quickly to a second-story apartment. Firemen arrived at 11 Englewood Ave. at 1:45 p.m. and fought the fire for about an hour. Although most of the fire was extinguished, many of the small children, who were sleeping in the apartment, were injured.

There were reports last night that a second fire bomb was thrown at the building from the street. The fire department is still investigating.
